Effectiveness Monitoring Committee (EMC)

Request for Applicants

May 09, 2017

The EMC was formed by the California State Board of Forestry and Fire Protection (Board) in October 2014. The goal of the EMC is to establish a collaborative, transparent, and science-based monitoring effort that delivers a process-based understanding of the effectiveness of the California Forest Practice Rules and other forestry-related laws and regulations in maintaining or enhancing water quality, aquatic habitat, and wildlife habitats. The EMC provides the Board, the Natural Resources Agency, and the State and Regional Water Boards with a science-based committee to better understand the effectiveness of specific requirements in these laws and regulations in achieving resource objectives, including the ecologic performance requirements of AB 1492. The EMC acts as a technical advisory committee to, and receives oversight from, the Board to develop and implement an effectiveness monitoring program that can provide an active feedback loop to policymakers, managers, agencies, and the public. BACKGROUND INFORMATION

The Board appoints EMC members from the monitoring community, as well as from state and federal agencies. The EMC is currently seeking to fill three **(3) vacancies dedicated to academia** on the committee. **Applicants will need to either hold positions in academia and/or be actively involved in research sponsored/funded by collegiate institutions.** Terms for EMC members range from two to three years. Applicants are requested to have scientific and natural resource professional backgrounds, and have demonstrated previous collaboration in resource monitoring or scientific studies. Applicants must be capable of working collaboratively and developing work products in a timely manner. Applicants must have (1) expertise in hydrology, geology, fluvial geomorphology, aquatic ecology, fisheries, forestry, wildlife management, or resource monitoring and assessment; and (2) a working knowledge of the California Forest Practice Rules and associated regulations, as well as forest management operations on private and state forestlands. EMC members are appointed by the Board from academia, landowners, professional consulting firms, industry, and the public. There is no compensation for service on this advisory group, but members are reimbursed for their expenses in attending meetings to the extent that California law allows. EMC meetings are open to the public and generally occur at least once every two months. Locations are usually in Redding or Ukiah and webinars are used for remote participation by the public.
