In addition to his love of the woods, he enjoyed many years of farming and raising livestock, hunting, fishing, watching the snow melt on Mt. Shasta and growing the best darn tomatoes around.

He is survived by his three children. His daughter Dawn Langston and her husband Paul



Doug was born on October 1, 1948, in Berkeley, the second of four sons to Dr. Philip and Esther Ferrier. He spent his childhood in Berkeley before receiving his Bachelor's degree in Forest Resource Management from the University of Idaho at Moscow in 1971. He then took a private forester's job in the Fresno area for a short time before settling into his beloved Dutch Flat, where he lived the remainder of his life. In Dutch Flat, he established his forestry business, Forest Slopes Management, and was a well-respected leader in the forestry industry over the past forty years. During his career as a consulting forester he was very dedicated and worked tirelessly with the California Board of Forestry, the Association of Consulting Foresters and California Licensed Foresters Association. He served on the Professional Foresters Examination Committee (PFEC) where he represented the highest standard of professional forestry for over 25 years and was Chairman of the PFEC for the majority of that time served. Doug started coming up to Dutch Flat as a boy with his family, finally living in the cabin owned by his grandparents. Doug's family has been coming to Dutch Flat since the 1920's. Doug was an accomplished historian of the area, publishing many articles. He was President of the

Golden Drift Historical Society and Museum for more than 10 years, working closely with Placer County archives in providing them with historical information. He was also the Chairman of the Board of Governors for the Dutch Flat Swimming Pool Corporation for many years. Doug was preceded in death by both of his parents, and his long-time partner Nancy Dailey. Jeff Hansen remembers his father putting a large stake in the surrounding community. "He was very involved in the youth of the community," Jeff Hansen said. "In everything from 4-H to FFA to the Little League and football programs, everything from Boy Scouts, Girl Scouts, Eagle Scouts, I mean the list just goes on and on. "When Orson Hansen's father, Arlie Hansen, decided to step back from the company in the mid-1980s, Orson Hansen took over the business along with his sister, Sue Peterson, and a myriad of other family members who still work for the company to this day. As the leader of the company, Orson Hansen, in all respects, was its foundation. "He was totally devoted to his family and his grandchildren and children," Jeff Hansen said. "Totally devoted to all of us growing up with our sporting events and whatever club or organization we were in at the time, he always made time to support us in growing up." Jeff Hansen said his father also brought those family values to his business. "Even though we're a larger employer in the area, we provide a family atmosphere to the business," Jeff Hansen said. Raymond Award for Outstanding Contributions to California Forestry” will be granted in name to Doug Ferrier this year by the California Board of Forestry and Fire Protection (BOF) at their August 26, 2015 meeting in Sacramento, Ca. Having passed away earlier this year, Ferrier was chosen to receive the award as an industry leader and respected forester over his 40-year career.

He was a registered professional forester who was noted for caring deeply about the practice of forestry and professional excellence in his field. Ferrier was Chairman for 14 of the 23 years that he served on the Professional Foresters Examination Committee. He worked closely with the BOF to affect positive change in forest practice as well as with the Association of Consulting Foresters and the California Licensed Foresters Association. He was respected by his peers and a mentor to many in the industry.

Ferrier's strive for excellence carried over into his personal life as well as he dedicated much of his free time to helping to improve the quality of life for his Dutch Flat community, serving as the President of the Golden Drift Historical Society and Museum for more than 10 years as well as Chairman of the Board of Governors for the Dutch Flat Swimming Pool Corporation for many years.

The award is named for Francis H. Raymond, who was the Director of the California Department of Forestry and Fire Protection from 1953 to 1970. Mr. Raymond was one of the primary advocates for the passage of the Professional Foresters Law in 1973. Since 1987 it has been awarded to a group or individual who has achieved excellence in forestry in California.

PROFESSIONAL FORESTERS REGISTRATION FUND

During the last issue of the Licensing News, which admittedly was far too long ago, the issue of the Professional Foresters Registration Fund (PFRF) was addressed. The issue discussed was both the long term and short term sustainability of the fund, which directly links to program sustainability. The operating and personnel expenses of the program are paid out of the PFRF, which is a special fund within the CAL FIRE budget. Revenues to the fund are primarily from bi-annual license renewals and examination fees. At the close of fiscal year 14/15 the PFRF balance was approximately \$350,000.

I take the issue of fund sustainability seriously. When the topic was raised it launched me into several months of investigation into the accounting of the fund. Given my rudimentary explanation of revenue versus costs of the fund above, it seems as though the accounting would be relatively straight forward, but it was not. Issues of renewal periods and ends of fiscal years overlapping was an issue, as well as budgetary

projections, and lastly reports of fund balance over the last decade was not abundantly clear or easy to come by. The fund is well managed, it is simply that the reports on the fund conditions were difficult to utilize when looking at long or short term sustainability. As a result, a new report design was generated and some modest new accounting practices have been implemented that will make it easier for the program manager, the Professional Foresters Examining Committee (PFEC), and CAL FIRE accounting to look into fund sustainability.

It has been a year since the reporting and accounting changes have taken place. The PFEC has been reviewing fund conditions reports over the last year as an information gathering exercise. The Acting Executive Officer will be meeting with an accounting team in September to reinitiate the review of fund and program sustainability and will report findings to the PFEC in December for discussion. RPF/LTO Responsibilities

In 2013 Associated California Loggers (ACL) brought forth a request for review to the Board of Forestry and Fire Protection. The problem statement, as framed by the Professional Foresters Examining Committee (PFEC) is as follows:

“Issues arise when Registered Professional Foresters (RPFs) do not complete their field work correctly and thoroughly, putting the LTO in a position to be cited by CALFIRE for violating the Forest Practice Rules (FPRs). In some cases LTOs are being issued violations for following incomplete or inaccurate field work that was performed by a RPF. The RPF should be held responsible for their work, along with any ramifications that occur if their work is not performed correctly.”


The PFEC was tasked by the Forest Practice Committee (FPC) to investigate the potential problem and develop a recommendation(s), if needed, to address the identified problem. This issue has resided with the PFEC for several meetings and the discussion has been robust, with input from ACL, California Licensed Foresters Association, private consulting foresters, CAL FIRE and Board staff.

To date, the PFEC has not yet finalized any recommendations for FPC to discuss, but options for recommendations range from no action, potential regulatory revisions for the Forest Practice Rules, or a non-regulatory pathway which could entail revision of existing Board Policy, a Memorandum of Understanding, or Board letter to the Department conveying concerns and/or perceived potential solutions to the problem. Board staff has developed and list of optional solutions that may address the identified problem for consideration by the PFEC. The identified staff options will be thoroughly vetted during the coming August 20, 2015 meeting in Sacramento. 2015 Registered Professional Forester Employment Survey

The PFEC and Licensing Office Staff decided to put an employment survey at the bottom of renewal forms to gather data information about RPF employment. Although, renewal season is not quite over yet, we collected **489** total RPF's information so far and briefly put together a chart below that depicts the data that was captured. Keep in mind, this information may be skewed as not all RPFs participated in filling out this information on their renewal forms. We also noticed that a select few RPFs that did participate had selected more than one category which affected our data as well. We plan to update this employment survey as we collect and refine data. This information was requested by several RPFs within the community, as well as by the PFEC, with the intent of gathering demographics of employment for general knowledge purposes. We will continue collecting data for future renewal periods so we are able to be more accurate on the

demographics on a larger time scale. Please continue to provide this information on renewal forms as requested; we appreciate all participation.



Recently Adopted and Approved Board Regulations

1. The “Drought Mortality Amendments, 2015” emergency rulemaking action became effective on 7/13/2015 and will expire on 1/12/2016.

The effect of the proposed action is to provide a person engaging in the cutting or removal of dead or dying trees of any size an exemption, from the plan preparation and submission requirements (PRC § 4581) and from the completion report and stocking report requirements (PRC §§ 4585 and 4587) of the Forest Practice Act, to capture mortality, address the fuel conditions being made worse by the drought and tree mortality and reduce the falling hazard associated with deteriorating trees. The regulation also includes the addition of drought as one of the conditions that constitute an emergency in order to enable a person to submit an Emergency Notice to harvest trees that are fallen, damaged, dead or dying as a result of this condition.

2. The “Protection of Habitable Structures Exemption, 2015” emergency rulemaking action became effective on 07/11/2015 and will expire 12/22/2015

The effect of the proposed action is to provide an exemption, from the plan preparation and submission requirements (PRC § 4581) and from the completion report and stocking

report requirements (PRC §§ 4585 and 4587) of the FPA, to a person engaging in the cutting or removal of trees between 150 ft and 300 ft of an Approved and Legally Permitted Habitable Structure contingent upon certain conditions for the purposes of reducing flammable materials and maintaining a fuel break.

Simultaneously, regular rulemaking is underway to make permanent these amendments, with modifications. The 45- day notice for which was published on July 10, 2015 and the initial hearing will be on August 26, 2015.

3. The "SRA Fire Prevention Fee Exemption (Self-Certification of Home Loss), 2015" emergency re-adoption rulemaking action became effective on 06/30/2015 and expire 09/28/2015."

The effect of the proposed action is to provide Owners of Habitable Structures the ability to request Exemption from the Fire Prevention Fee, if their Habitable Structure has been destroyed by natural disaster to avoid having to receive a bill associated with a Habitable Structure that no longer exists.

Simultaneously, regular rulemaking is underway to make permanent these amendments, with modifications. The 45- day notice for which was published on July 10, 2015 and the initial hearing will be on August 26, 2015.

Recently Appointed Board Member

Kimberly Rodrigues, 56, of Woodland, has been appointed to the California Board of Forestry and Fire Protection. She holds a Registered Professional Forester License; RPF 2326. Rodrigues has been director of the Hopland Research and Extension Center at the University of California Division of Agriculture and Natural Resources since 2015, where she has held several positions since 1999, including executive director of the Academic Personnel Unit and North Coast and mountain regional director. She was a forestry advisor at the University of California Cooperative Extension from 1991 to 1999, a tree improvement specialist at Simpson Timber Company from 1985 to 1991 and chief forester at Applied Forest Genetics from 1984 to 1985. Rodrigues is a member of the Association of Natural Resource Extension Professionals. She earned a Doctor of Philosophy degree in environmental science, policy and management from the University of California, Berkeley and a Master of Science degree in forest genetics from Colorado State University. This position requires Senate confirmation and there is no compensation. Rodrigues is a Democrat.

Board of Forestry and Fire Protection Seeks Nominations for Professional Foresters Examining Committee (PFEC)

The Board of Forestry and Fire Protection (Board) is requesting nomination for one (1) upcoming vacancy on the Professional Foresters Examining Committee (PFEC). PRC §763 establishes the PFEC as a committee of the Board consisting of at least seven members (the PFEC currently hosts 8 members), and distributed as follows:

1. Two public members with one selected from the membership of the Board (committee currently

has three public members).

2. At least four Registered Professional Foresters (RPFs) representing a broad cross section of employment and expertise, and
3. At least one certified specialist (Certified Rangeland Manager) pursuant to PRC §772. If a certified specialist is not available to serve on the committee, this position shall be replaced by an additional professional forester in good standing.

The PFEC serves at the pleasure of the Board and is charged with the examination of individuals for registration as RPFs. It initiates and monitors investigations into complaints made against RPFs, and recommends appropriate disciplinary action to the Board pursuant to 14 CCR § 1612. The PFEC also provides oversight for the specialty certificate programs adopted by the Board and may investigate other issues involving RPFs or CRMs when requested by the Board.

PFEC members serve a four-year term. The PFEC currently meets approximately four times annually, depending on the level of licensing and disciplinary issues. Additional meetings may be scheduled if found necessary by the Chairman of the committee.

The next scheduled meeting is August 20th, 2015. All other dates are to be determined depending on availability of the PFEC members.

There will be one position as a Public Member to be filled effective January 2016.
